# **The Lynton And Barnstaple Railway Trust**

## **Memorandum of Association**

1. The Company's name is The Lynton And Barnstaple Railway Trust (and in this document is called 'the Charity').
2. The Charity's registered office is to be situated in England.
3. The Charity's objects ('the Objects') are
  - (1) To acquire preserve and restore for the public benefit items of historical, architectural, engineering or scientific value in connection with railways; and
  - (2) To advance the education of the public in the history sociology and technology of narrow-gauge railways and railways in general by the acquisition, restoration, preservation, creation and exhibition of railway locomotives, carriages, rolling stock, equipment, artefacts, documents and records, together with any appropriate land, buildings and structures in particular but not exclusively those of the former Lynton & Barnstaple Railway in Devonshire ('the railway') and to provide educational and training facilities to those engaged in the restoration and operation of the railway or railways generally. *(Amended by Special Resolution dated 24<sup>th</sup> March 2007)*
4. In furtherance of the Objects but not otherwise the Charity may exercise the following powers:
  - (1) To study, compile records on and acquire, build, restore, reinstate, rebuild, create, reconstruct, preserve and maintain railway lines, trackbed, locomotives, rolling stock and other items of railway interest, and to provide training and instruction in such activities and in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing those associated with the former Lynton & Barnstaple Railway, the former Southern Railway and other railways and to enter into such agreements and to take all such steps as may be necessary for these purposes, and to organise, sponsor and support displays and such other shows and events for the provision and stimulation of information, education and interest in such vehicles and other items of railway interest. *(Amended by Special Resolution dated 24<sup>th</sup> March 2007)*
  - (2) to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute and issue promissory notes, bills, cheques and other instruments, and to operate bank accounts in the name of the Charity;
  - (3) to raise funds and to invite and receive contributions: providing that in raising funds the Charity shall not undertake any substantial permanent trading activity and shall conform to any relevant statutory regulations;
  - (4) to acquire, alter, improve and (subject to such consents as may be required by law) to charge or otherwise dispose of property;
  - (5) subject to clause 6 below to employ such staff who shall not be directors of the Charity (herein after referred to as 'the Trustees'), as are necessary for the proper pursuit of the Objects and to make all reasonable and necessary provision for the payment of pensions and superannuation to staff and their dependants;

(6) to establish or support any charitable trusts, associations or institutions formed for all or any of the Objects;

(7) to co-operate with other charities, voluntary bodies and statutory authorities operating in furtherance of the objects or similar charitable purposes and to exchange information and advice with them;

(8) to preserve and or display historic structures, buildings, artefacts, relics and documents relating to the railway or railways generally.

(9) to pay out of the funds of the trust the costs charges and expenses of and incidental to any changes required to the Trust Deed, Memorandum and Articles, or Constitution whichever is in force;

(10) to restore replicate and preserve the locomotives and rolling stock that operated on the railway.

(11) to assist in the maintenance for future generations of the heritage of narrow gauge railway operations on the railway.

(12) to carry out research into the history and operation of the railway or railways generally to study local history in relation thereto and to publish or otherwise disseminate of the result of such research and study.

(13) to maintain and operate a museum or display centre for relics and other items of interest relating to and illustrating the history and operation of the railway and railways generally.

(14) to establish and maintain museums, heritage centres and displays and seek any appropriate registration thereof.

(15) to amalgamate with any trusts, companies, institutions, societies or associations which are charitable at law and have objectives altogether or mainly similar to those of the trust and prohibit the payment of profit to and the distribution of any of their assets amongst their members or trustees at least to the same extent as such payments are prohibited in the case of the trust

(16) to form companies wholly owned by the trustees to carry out trading activities for the benefit of the trust

(17) To manufacture, produce, print, engrave, publish, edit, distribute, buy, sell and deal in newspapers, periodicals, posters, leaflets, books, booklets, maps, guides, calendars, films, film strips, photographs, records, record cards, prints, art works and other visual and audio material, provided that the Trust shall not engage in any activities which are in the nature of permanent trading in raising funds for the said objects.

(18) To acquire by gift, devise, purchase, lease, hire or otherwise, any real or personal property, and any estate or interest therein, and any rights or privileges necessary or convenient, or capable of being used or applied for any of the purposes of the Trust, and subject to such consents as may be required by law, to sell, lease, lend or dispose of or otherwise deal with all or any part of the same in such manner as may be thought fit with a view to the promotion of the objects of the Trust.

(19) To be able to accept any bequest, devise, gift or donation whatsoever (whether of money or of property of any description) towards the objects of the Trust and to apply the same or the proceeds of sale or realisation thereof to the objects of the Trust or to invest the same or such proceeds, and to apply the income arising there from, for any of the objects of the Trust.

(20) Generally to obtain money for the objects of the Trust in any lawful manner and to invest, apply or deal with in such lawful manner as may be considered most desirable for effecting such objects.

(21) To invest any moneys of the Trust not immediately required for its purposes in or upon such investments securities or property as may be thought fit, subject nevertheless to such conditions (if any) and such consents (if any) as may for the time being be imposed or required by law and subject also as hereinafter provided.

(22) Subject to such consents (if any) as may be required by law, to borrow or to raise money and for the purpose of securing any debt or obligation of the Trust to mortgage or charge all or any part of its property and assets, present or future.

(23) To aid and co-operate with any charitable association, society or corporation having amongst its objects similar objects to those which are included within the objects of the Trust and to liaise and co-operate with any company operating the Lynton & Barnstaple Railway or any part thereof.

(24) To subscribe, make donations or loans (provided such loans are made in direct furtherance of its objects or for investment purposes) to any such association, society, trust or corporation as aforesaid with a view to obtaining any advantages or benefits for or promoting the objects of the Trust or to amalgamate with any such body having charitable objects similar to those of the Trust.

(25) To set up, maintain, manage or to assist in the setting up and maintenance or management of charitable museums or other premises for the purpose of the preservation and public exhibition of transport relics, books, drawings, records, documents, sound and visual recordings, cinematograph films and photographs as aforesaid and to act in any trust for or as trustee of any property devoted to such purposes.

(26) To insure the property of the Charity against any foreseeable risk and to take out other insurance policies to protect the Charity when required

(27) To insure the Trustees against the costs of a successful defence to a criminal prosecution brought against them as charity trustees or against personal liability incurred in respect of any act or omission which is or is alleged to be a breach of trust or breach of duty, unless the Trustee concerned knew that, or was reckless whether, the act or omission was a breach of trust or breach of duty

(28) to do all such other lawful things as are necessary for the achievement of the objects. *(Amended by Special Resolution dated 24<sup>th</sup> March 2007)*

5. The income and property of the charity shall be applied solely towards the promotion of the Objects and no part shall be paid or transferred, directly or indirectly, by way of dividend, bonus or otherwise by way of profit, to members of the Charity, and no trustee shall be appointed to any office of the Charity paid by salary or fees or receive any remuneration or other benefit in money or money's worth from the Charity: Provided that nothing in this document shall prevent any payment in good faith by the Charity:

(1) of the usual professional charges for business done by any trustee who is a solicitor, accountant or other person engaged in a profession, or by any partner of his or hers, when instructed by the Charity to act in a professional capacity on its behalf: Provided that at no time shall a majority of the trustees benefit under this provision and that a trustee shall withdraw from any meeting at which his or her appointment or remuneration, or that of his or her partner, is under discussion;

(2) of reasonable and proper remuneration for any services rendered to the Charity by any member, officer or servant of the Charity who is not a trustee;

(3) of interest on money lent by any member of the Charity or trustee at a reasonable and proper rate per annum not exceeding 2 per cent less than the published base lending rate of a clearing bank to be selected by the trustees:

(4) of fees, remuneration or other benefit in money or money's worth to any company of which a trustee may also be a member holding not more than 1/100th part of the issued capital of that company;

(5) of reasonable and proper rent for premises demised or let by any member of the Company or a trustee;

(6) to any trustee of reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

6. The liability of the members is limited.

7. Every member of the Charity undertakes to contribute such amount as may be required (not exceeding £10) to the Charity's assets if it should be wound up while he or she is a member or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member, for payment of the Charity's debts and liabilities contracted before he or she ceases to be a member, and of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributories among themselves.

8. If the Charity is wound up or dissolved and after all its debts and liabilities have been satisfied there remains any property it shall not be paid to or distributed among the members of the Charity, but shall be given or transferred to some other charity or charities having objects similar to the Objects which prohibits the distribution of its or their income and property to an extent at least as great as is imposed on the Charity by Clause 5 above, chosen by the members of the Charity at or before the time of the dissolution and if that cannot be done then to some other charitable object.

# **The Lynton And Barnstaple Railway Trust**

## **Articles of Association**

### **Interpretation**

1. In these articles:

'the Charity' means the company intended to be regulated by these articles;

'the Act' means the Companies Act 1985 including any statutory modification or re-enactment thereof for the time being in force;

'the articles' means these Articles of Association of the Charity;

'clear days' in relation to the period of a notice means the period excluding the day when the notice is given or deemed to be given and the day for which it is given or on which it is to take effect;

'executed' includes any mode of execution;

'the memorandum' means the memorandum of association of the Charity;

'office' means the registered office of the Charity;

'the seal' means the common seal of the Charity if it has one;

'secretary' means the secretary of the Charity or any other person appointed to perform the duties of the secretary of the Charity including a joint, assistant or deputy secretary;

'the trustees' means the directors of the Charity (and 'trustee' has a corresponding meaning);

'the United Kingdom' means Great Britain and Northern Ireland;

and words importing the masculine gender only shall include the feminine gender.

Subject as aforesaid, words or expressions contained in these Articles shall, unless the context requires otherwise, bear the same meanings as in the Act.

### **Members**

2. (1) The subscribers to the memorandum and such other persons or organisations as are admitted to membership in accordance with the rules made under Article 61 shall be members of the Charity. No person shall be admitted a member of the Charity unless his application for membership is approved by the trustees.

(2) Unless the trustees or the Charity in general meeting shall make other provision under article 61, the trustees may in their absolute discretion permit any member of the Charity to retire, providing that after such retirement the number of members is not less than two.

### **General meetings**

3. The Charity shall hold an annual general meeting each year in addition to any other meetings in that year, and shall specify the meetings as such in the notices calling it; and not more than fifteen months shall elapse between the date of one annual general meeting of the Charity and that of the next; Provided that so long as the Charity holds its first annual general meeting within eighteen months of its incorporation, it need not hold it in the year of its incorporation or in the following year. The annual general meeting shall be held at such times and places, as the trustees shall appoint. All general meetings other than annual general meetings shall be called extraordinary general meetings.

4. The trustees may call general meetings and, on the requisition of members pursuant to the provisions of the Act, shall forthwith, proceed to convene an extraordinary general meeting for a date not later than eight weeks after receipt of the requisition. If there are not within the United Kingdom sufficient trustees to call a general meeting, any trustee or any member of the charity may call a general meeting.

### **Notice of general meetings**

5. An annual general meeting and an extraordinary general meeting called for the passing of a special resolution appointing a person as a trustee shall be called by at least twenty one clear days notice. All other extraordinary general meetings shall be called by at least fourteen clear days notice but a general meeting may be called by shorter notice if so agreed.

(1) in the case of an annual general meeting by all the members entitled to attend and vote, and

(2) in the case of any other meeting by a majority in number of members having a right to attend meetings and vote being a majority together holding not less than 95 percent of the total voting rights at the meeting of all the members. The notice shall specify the time and place of the meeting and the general nature of the business to be transacted and, in the case of an annual general meeting shall specify the meeting as such. The notice shall be given to all the members and to the trustees and auditors. The accidental omission to give notice of a meeting to, or the non receipt of a notice of a meeting by, any person entitled to receive notice shall not invalidate the proceedings at that meeting.

### **Proceedings at general meetings**

7. No business shall be transacted at any meeting unless a quorum is present in person or by proxy. Ten persons entitled to vote upon the business to be transacted, each being a member or a duly authorised representative of a member organisation, or three percent of such persons for the time being, whichever is the greater, shall constitute a quorum. *(Amended by Special Resolution dated 9<sup>th</sup> May 2009 and also amended by Special Resolution dated 14<sup>th</sup> May 2011.)*

8. If a quorum is not present within half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting, or if during the meeting a quorum ceases to be present, the meeting shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place or to such time and place as the trustees may determine.

9. The chairman, if any, of the trustees or in his absence some other trustee nominated by the trustees shall preside as chairman of the meeting, but if neither the chairman nor such other trustee (if any) be present within fifteen minutes after the time appointed for holding the meeting and willing to act, the trustees present shall elect one of their numbers to be chairman and, if there is only one trustee present and willing to act, he shall be chairman.

10. If no trustee is willing to act as chairman, or if no trustee is present within fifteen minutes after the time appointed for holding the meeting, the members present and entitled to vote shall choose one of their numbers to be chairman.

11. A trustee shall, notwithstanding that he is not a member, be entitled to attend and speak at any general meeting.

12. The chairman may, with the consent of a meeting at which a quorum is present (and shall if so directed by the meeting), adjourn the meeting from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than business which might properly have been transacted at the meeting had adjournment not taken place. When a meeting is adjourned for fourteen days or more, at least seven clear days notice shall be given specifying the time and place of the adjourned meeting and the general nature of the business to be transacted. Otherwise it shall not be necessary to give any such notice.

13. A resolution put to the vote of a meeting shall be decided on a show of hands unless before, or on the declaration of the result of, the show of hands a poll is duly demanded. Subject to the provisions of the Act a poll may be demanded:

(1) by the chairman; or

(2) by at least two members having the right to vote at the meeting; or

(3) by a member or members representing not less than one-tenth of the total voting rights of all the members having the right to vote at the meetings.

14. Unless a poll is duly demanded a declaration by the chairman that a resolution has been carried or carried unanimously, or by a particular majority, or lost, or not carried by a particular majority and an entry to that effect in the minutes of the meeting shall be conclusive evidence of the fact without proof of the number or proportion of the votes recorded in favour of or against the resolution.

15. The demand for a poll may be withdrawn before the poll is taken, but only with the consent of the chairman. The withdrawal of a demand for a poll shall not invalidate the result of a show of hands declared before the demand for the poll was made.

16. A poll shall be taken as the chairman directs and he may appoint scrutineers (who need not be members) and fix a time and place for declaring the results of the poll. The result of the poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the meeting at which the poll is demanded.

17. In the case of an equality of votes, whether on a show of hands or on a poll the chairman shall be entitled to a casting vote in addition to any other vote he may have.

18. A poll demanded on the election of a chairman or on a question of adjournment shall be taken immediately. A poll demanded on any other question shall be taken either immediately or at such time and place as the chairman directs not being more than thirty days after the poll is demanded. The demand for a poll shall not prevent continuance of a meeting for the transaction of any business other than the question on which the poll is demanded. If a poll is demanded before the declaration of the result of a show of hands and the demand is duly withdrawn, the meeting shall continue as if the demand has not been made.

19. No notice need be given of a poll not taken immediately if the time and place at which it is to be taken are announced at the meeting at which it is demanded. In other cases at least seven clear days notice shall be given specifying the time and place at which the poll is to be taken.

## **Votes of members**

20. Subject to article 17, and as hereinafter provided, every member of the Trust shall have one vote. A Corporate Member shall have one vote which shall be exercisable by its representative. Voting rights of Family Members may not exceed two adults. (*Amended by Special Resolution 17<sup>th</sup> May 2008*)

21. No member shall be entitled to vote at any general meeting unless all moneys then payable by him to the Charity have been paid.

22. No objection shall be raised to the qualification of any voter except at the meeting or adjourned meeting at which the vote objected to is tendered, and every vote not disallowed at the meeting shall be valid. Any objections made in due time shall be referred to the chairman whose decision shall be final and conclusive..

23. A vote given or poll demanded by the duly authorised representative of a member organisation shall be valid notwithstanding the previous determination of the authority of the person voting or demanding a poll unless notice of the determination was received by the Charity at the office before the commencement of the meeting or adjourned meeting at which the vote was given or the poll demanded or (in the case of a poll taken otherwise than on the same day as the meeting or adjourned meeting) the time appointed for taking the poll.

24. Any organisation which is a member of the charity may by resolution of its Council or other governing body authorise such person as it thinks fit to act as its representative at any meeting of the Charity and the persons so authorised shall be entitled to exercise the same powers on behalf of the organisation which he represents as the organisation could exercise if it were an individual member of the Charity.

25. Any member of the Trust entitled to attend and vote at a General Meeting shall be entitled to appoint another member as his proxy to attend and vote instead of him and any proxy so appointed shall have the same right as the member to speak at the Meeting.

26. On a poll votes may be given either personally or by proxy. An instrument appointing a proxy shall be in the usual form or such form as the Trust shall approve.

27. The appointment of a proxy shall be deposited or received at the registered office of the Trust or at such other place within the United Kingdom as is specified for that purpose in the notice convening the meeting, not less than 48 hours before the time for holding the meeting or adjourned meeting at which the person appointed as proxy proposes to vote, or in the case of a poll, not less than 24 hours before the time appointed for the taking of the poll, and in default the instrument of proxy shall not be treated as valid.

28. An instrument appointing a proxy shall be in the usual form or such form as the Trust shall approve.

29. In the case of an appointment of a proxy contained in an electronic communication, where an address has been specified for the purpose of receiving electronic communications:

- (i) In the notice convening the meeting, or
- (ii) In any instrument of proxy sent out by the Society in relation to the meeting,

or

- (iii) In any invitation contained in an electronic communication to appoint a proxy issued by the Society in relation to the meeting, the appointment of proxy must be received at such address not later than 48 hours before the time for the holding of the meeting at which the person named in the appointment proposes to vote.

30. The appointment of a proxy shall be deemed to confer authority to demand or join in demanding a poll.

31. Where practicable, a member of the Trust, entitled to vote, will be delegated by the Trustees to act as their delegated proxy at any General Meeting of any of the Trust's subsidiary companies. In all other cases, members of the Trust will be consulted, and their views taken into account by the Trustees, in respect of any ordinary, special, or extraordinary resolution to be considered at any meeting of any subsidiary company.

32. A member duly delegated as a proxy by the Trustees, not attending a meeting of a subsidiary company of the Trust, may appoint any other member of the Trust entitled to vote and attending the meeting to act on his behalf as a proxy for the Trust. *(New Articles numbered 25 – 32 added. Existing Articles 25 – 61 renumbered to 33 – 69 by Special Resolution dated 17<sup>th</sup> May 2008)*

#### **Trustees**

33. The number of trustees shall not be less than three nor more than nine

*(Amended by Special Resolution dated 6<sup>th</sup> October 2001)*

34. The first trustees shall be those persons named in the statement delivered pursuant to section 10(2) of the Act, who shall be deemed to, have been appointed under the articles. Future trustees shall be appointed as provided subsequently in the articles.

#### **Power of Trustees**

35. Subject to the provisions of the Act, the memorandum and the articles and to any directions given by a special resolution, the business of the Charity shall be managed by the trustees who may exercise all the powers of the Charity. No alteration of the memorandum or the articles and no such direction shall invalidate any prior act of the trustees which would have been valid if that alteration had not been made or that direction had not been given. The powers given by this article shall not be limited by any special power given to the trustees by the articles and a meeting of trustees at which a quorum is present may exercise all the powers exercisable by the trustees.

36. In addition to all powers hereby expressly conferred upon them and without detracting from the generality of their powers under the articles the trustees shall have the following powers, namely:

(1) to expend the funds of the charity in such manner as they consider most beneficial for the achievement of the objects and to invest in the name of the charity such part of the funds as they may see fit and to direct the sale or transposition of any such investments and to expend the proceeds of any such sale in furtherance of the objects of the charity.

(2). To enter into contracts on behalf of the Charity.

## **Appointment and retirements of trustees**

37. At the first annual general meeting all the trustees shall retire from office, and at every subsequent annual general meeting one third of the trustees who are subject to retirement by rotation or, if their number is not three or a multiple of three, the number nearest to one third shall retire from office. But if there is only one trustee who is subject to retirement by rotation, he shall retire.

38. Subject to the provisions of the Act, the trustees to retire by rotation shall be those who have been longest in office since their last appointment or reappointment, but as between persons who became or were last reappointed trustees on the same day those to retire shall (unless they otherwise agree amongst themselves) be determined by lot.

39. If the Charity at the meeting at which a trustee retires by rotation, does not fill the vacancy the retiring trustee shall, if willing to act, be deemed to have been reappointed unless at the meeting it is resolved not to fill the vacancy or unless a resolution for the reappointment of the trustee is put to the meeting and lost.

40. No person other than a trustee retiring by rotation shall be appointed or reappointed a trustee at any general meeting unless:

- (1) he is recommended by the trustees, or
- (2) not less than thirty five nor more than forty nine clear days before the date appointed for the meeting, notice executed by a member qualified to vote at the meeting has been given to the Charity of the intention to propose that person for appointment or re appointment stating the particulars which would, if he were so appointed or reappointed, be required to be included in the Charity's register of trustees together with a notice executed by that person of his willingness to be appointed or reappointed.

41. No person may be appointed as a trustee:

- (1) unless he has attained the age of 18 years, or
- (2) in circumstances such that, had he already been a trustee, he would have been disqualified from acting under the provisions of Article 38 or

*(Amended by Special Resolution dated 24<sup>th</sup> March 2007)*

42. Not less than fourteen nor more than thirty five clear days before the date appointed for holding a general meeting notice shall be given to all persons who are entitled to receive notice of the meeting of any person (other than a trustee retiring in rotation at the meeting) who is recommended by the trustees for appointment or reappointment as a trustee at the meeting or in respect of whom a notice has been duly given to the Charity of the intention to propose him at the meeting for appointment or reappointment as a trustee. The notice shall give the particulars of that person which would, if he were so appointed or reappointed, be required to be included in the Charity's register of trustees.

*(Amended by Special Resolution dated 5<sup>th</sup> October 2002)*

43. Subject as aforesaid, the Charity may by ordinary resolution appoint a person who is willing to act to be a trustee either to fill a vacancy or as an additional trustee and may also determine the rotation in which any additional trustees are to retire.

44. The trustees may appoint a person who is willing to act to be a trustee either to fill a vacancy or as an additional trustee provided that the appointment does not cause the number of trustees to exceed any number fixed by or in accordance with the articles as the maximum number of trustees. A trustee so appointed shall hold office only until the next following annual general meeting and shall not be taken into account in determining the trustees who are to retire by rotation at the meeting. If not reappointed at such annual general meeting he shall vacate office at the conclusion thereof.

45. Subject as aforesaid, a trustee who retires at an annual general meeting may, if willing to act be reappointed.

#### **Disqualification and removal of Trustees**

46. A trustee shall cease to hold office if he

(1) ceases to be a trustee by virtue of any provision in the Act or is disqualified from acting as a trustee by virtue of section 72 of the charities Act 1993 (or any statutory re-enactment or modification of that provision);

(2) becomes incapable by reason of mental disorder, illness or injury of managing and administering his own affairs;

(3) resigns his office by notice to the charity (but only if at least two trustees will remain in office when the notice of resignation is to take effect);or

(4) is absent without permission of the trustees from all their meetings held within a period of six months and the trustees resolve that his office be vacated.

#### **Trustees' expenses**

47. The trustees may be paid all reasonable travelling, hotel and other expenses properly incurred by them in connection with their attendance's at meetings of trustees or committees of trustees or general meetings or otherwise in connection with the discharge of their duties, but shall otherwise be paid no remuneration.

#### **Trustees' appointments**

48. Subject to the provisions of the Act and to clause 5 of the memorandum, the trustees may appoint one or more of their numbers to the unremunerated office of managing director or to any other unremunerated executive office under the Charity. Any such appointment may be made upon such terms as the trustees determine. Any appointment of a trustee to an executive office shall terminate if he ceases to be a trustee.

49. Except to the extent permitted by clause 5 of the memorandum, no trustee shall take or hold any interest in property belonging to the Charity or receive remuneration or be interested otherwise than as a trustee in any other contract to which the charity is a party.

#### **Proceedings of Trustees**

50. Subject to the provisions of the articles, the trustees may regulate their proceedings as they think fit. A trustee may, and the secretary at the request of a trustee shall, call a meeting of the trustees. It shall not be necessary to give notice of a meeting to a trustee who is absent from the United Kingdom. Questions arising at a meeting shall be decided by a majority of votes. In the case of an equality of votes, the chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

51. The Quorum for the transaction of business of the Trustees may be fixed by the Trustees but shall not be less than five. *(Amended by Special Resolution dated 17<sup>th</sup> May 2008)*

52. The trustees may act notwithstanding any vacancies in their number, but, if the number of trustees is less than the number fixed as a quorum, the continuing trustees or trustee may act only for the purpose of filling vacancies or of calling a general meeting.

53. The trustees may appoint one of their number to be a chairman of their meetings and may at any time remove him from that office. Unless he is unwilling to do so, the trustee so appointed shall preside at every meeting of trustees at which he is present.

But if there is no trustee holding that office, or of the trustee holding it is unwilling to preside or is not present within five minutes after the time appointed for the meeting, the trustees present may appoint one of their number to be chairman of that meeting.

54. The trustees may appoint one or more sub-committees consisting of three or more trustees for the purpose of making any inquiry or supervising or performing any function or duty which in the opinion of the trustees would be more conveniently undertaken or carried out by a sub committee, provided that all acts and proceedings of any such sub-committees shall be fully and promptly reported to the trustees.

55. All acts done by a meeting of trustees, or of a committee of trustees, shall notwithstanding that it be afterwards discovered that there was a defect in the appointment of any trustee or that any of them were disqualified from holding office, or had vacated office, or were not entitled to vote, be as valid as if every such person had been duly appointed and was qualified and had continued to be a trustee and had been entitled to vote.

56. A resolution in writing, signed by all the trustees entitled to receive notice of a meeting of trustees or of a committee of trustees, shall be as valid and effective as if it had been passed at a meeting of trustees or (as the case may be) a committee of trustees duly convened and held. Such a resolution may consist of several documents in the same form, each signed by one or more trustees.

57. Any bank account in which part of the assets of the Charity is deposited shall be operated by the trustees and shall indicate the name of the Charity, All cheques and orders for payment from such an account shall be signed by two authorized persons, at least one of whom must be a trustee; and if such is for more than five hundred pounds, both persons shall be trustees.

*(Amended by Special Resolution dated 6<sup>th</sup> October 2001)*

### **Secretary**

58. Subject to the provisions of the Act, the secretary shall be appointed by the trustees for such term, at such remuneration (if not a trustee) and upon such conditions as they may think fit and any secretary so appointed may be removed by them.

### **Minutes**

59. The trustees shall keep minutes in books kept for the purpose;

(1) of all appointments of officers made by the trustees; and

(2) of all proceedings at meetings of the Charity and of the trustees and of committees of trustees including the names of the trustees present at each such meeting.

### **The Seal**

60. The seal shall only be used by the authority of the trustees or of a committee of trustees authorised by the trustees. The trustees may determine who shall sign any instrument to which the seal is affixed and unless otherwise so determined it shall be signed by a trustee and by the secretary or by a second trustee.

## **Accounts**

61. Accounts shall be prepared in accordance with the provisions of Part VII of the Act.

## **Annual Report**

62. The trustees shall comply with their obligations under the Charities Act 1992 (or any statutory re-enactment or modification of that Act) with regard to the preparation of an annual report and its transmission to the Commissioners.

## **Annual Return**

63. The trustees shall comply with their obligations under the Charities Act 1992 (or any statutory re-enactment or modification of that Act) with regard to the preparation of an annual return and its transmission to the commissioners.

## **Notices**

64. Any notice to be given to or by any person pursuant to the articles shall be in writing except that a notice calling a meeting of the trustees need not be in writing.

65. The Charity may give any notice to a member either personally or by sending it by post in a prepaid envelope addressed to the member at his registered address or by leaving it at that address. A member whose registered address is not within the United Kingdom and who gives to the company an address within the United Kingdom at which notices may be given to him shall be entitled to have notice given to him at that address, but otherwise no such member shall be entitled to receive any notice from the Charity.

66. A member present in person at any meeting of the Charity shall be deemed to have received notice of the meeting and, where necessary of the purpose for which it was called.

67. Proof that an envelope containing a notice was properly addressed prepaid and posted shall be conclusive evidence that the notice was given. A notice shall be deemed to be given at the expiration of 48 hours after the envelope containing it was posted.

## **Indemnity**

68. Subject to the provisions of the Act every trustee or other officer or auditor of the Charity shall be indemnified out of the assets of the Charity against any liability incurred by him in that capacity in defending any proceedings, whether civil or criminal, in which judgement is given in his favour or in which he is acquitted or in connection with any application in which relief is granted to him by the court from liability for negligence, default, breach of duty or breach of trust in relation to the affairs of the Charity.

## Rules

69. (1) The trustees may from time to time make such rules or bye laws as they may deem necessary or expedient or convenient for the proper conduct and management of the Charity and for the purpose of prescribing classes of and conditions of membership, and in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing, they may by such rules of bye laws regulate:

(i) The admission and classification of members of the Charity (including the admission of organisations to membership) and the rights and privileges of such members, and the conditions of membership and the terms on which members may resign or have their membership terminated and the entrance fees, subscriptions and other fees or payments to be made by members.

(ii) the conduct of members of the Charity in relation to one another, and to the Charity's servants;

(iii) the setting aside of the whole or any part or parts of the Charity's premises at any particular time or times or for any particular purpose or purpose;

(iv) the procedures at general meetings and meetings of the trustees and committees of the trustees in so far as such procedure is not regulated by the articles;

(v) generally, all such matters as are commonly the subject matter of company rules.

(2) The Charity in general meetings shall have the power to alter, add to or repeal the rules or bye laws and the trustees shall adopt such means as they think sufficient to bring to the notice of members of the Charity all such rules or bye laws, which shall be binding on all members of the Charity. Provided that no rule or bylaw shall be inconsistent with, or shall effect or repeal anything contained in, the memorandum or the articles
